

#### Brexit to Coronovirus via Cape Town

On the 6<sup>th</sup> January 2020, James and I boarded a cruise ship called the 'Marco Polo' for an eleven-week cruise to celebrate 50 years of marriage this September. It was a trip that we will remember for some good times and some challenging times.

The first night on board was rough. Going around Land's End really affected me, so I was worried about the reputation of the Bay of Biscay but fortunately, this was reasonable and I coped. Lisbon and Marrakesh were our next stops. We had been to Lisbon previously but I was intrigued with Morocco, an Arabic country in Africa.

We then continued down the west side of Africa, with rough seas again, before arriving at Namibia and South Africa. This was a country that I had been aware of all my life with a secondary school friend coming from Cape Town. Table Mountain was not as I expected, with it now virtually being in the centre of the city. I thought it would be more like Uluru in Australia. Whilst in Port Elizabeth, we visited the townships and a local primary school. It was an eye opener. South Africa still has much to do to end segregation and with the tourist industry in lockdown, this will make a difference too.

After South Africa we visited Mayotte, an African country speaking French, located in the Indian Ocean. A strange mix being the remnants of past empires. Then back to the African mainland to visit Zanzibar and Mombasa in Kenya before sailing to the Seychelles. Here the colour of the water will remain with me forever, with so many different shades of blue all in one place.

Then it was onto the Maldives where we did a submarine dive to visit the fish and see the coral, an experience I will never forget. The next stop on the schedule was Sri Lanka and India, a continent we had visited before. On the waterways of Kerala, we came to a large lake and out of the blue a small boat appeared with a man selling ice cream and drinks, presumably his only income? How is he faring today, I wonder?

Then we visited Oman and Egypt to travel to the Valley of the Kings. A long day trip but well worthwhile and I now have a better understanding of Egyptology, a subject our eldest granddaughter has been interested in all her life. The next stop was Jordan.

Coronavirus had caught up with us by now. In fact, at several stops after  $26^{th}$  February we had to fill out health questionnaires and have our temperature taken using a thermal reader. Coronavirus and news from home became the talking point on the ship and after leaving Jordan; we were told that there were no more ports on our route accepting ships. We sailed straight back to Bristol for fourteen days, missing out two ports that I had wanted to visit, namely Jerusalem and La Coruna for a visit to Santiago De Compostela. They will go back on my bucket list.

Life on board the ship became monotonous and frustrating for all of us. However, jewellery classes, lectures, new friends, eating, reading, sewing and an excellent evening entertainment helped us pass the time. We had a church service every Sunday, when we were at sea, organised by the passengers and attended by about sixty people that included at least two communions. These services will be remembered as a time of quiet contemplation in light of everything else that was happening on the ship and in the world.

We ended up having fifty-three days at sea instead of forty-three and visiting twenty-five ports instead of thirty-five. And after all of that, we returned to a country where we were not able to cuddle family or enjoy our summer activities.

Would I cruise again? Possibly not! Would it even be possible? Cruising and the world has changed over the last four months but I gained a better understanding of the geography, size and population difficulties in our amazing world and am thankful for such a wonderful opportunity.

#### **Christian Aid --- Fifty Years of Collecting**

This month has seen one of many firsts come along to remind us of how Covid-19 is affecting Church life; this time frustrating any chance of our being able to continue our annual house to house collection on behalf of Christian Aid. From the records I have been able to see in our archives, which go back at least to 1970, it would seem that in all that time we as a Church, have been responsible for House to House collections each year, initially in some 47 local roads. Regrettably, as our congregation has got smaller, the number of roads we could cover has reduced, but happily the generosity of the donors has increased, so that the amount collected has more than offset the reduced breadth of our collecting area.

Back in the 1970s the amount being raised was in the range £350-£450 each year, with some 50 or more collectors or envelope distributors, whereas by the turn of the Century the total raised was up to £1373, with just under 20 collectors. From then on the change in the value of money, and the appreciation of the work being carried out through Christian Aid, led to more generous totals with a peak in 2003 of £2,072, and consistently since then, totals in the range of £1,500 to £1,900 each year. This has been achieved with fewer and fewer collectors, who must be sincerely thanked for their dedication to the cause.

In total I believe our Church has collected donations amounting to some £51,500 for Christian Aid over the last fifty years, to which has to be added Gift Aid on some of these donations; a very creditable and worthwhile contribution of which the Church can be proud.

#### WORLD'S OLDEST MAN

It is often said that Christians are long-lived. Within our small congregation at one stage, I seem to remember, we had 4 centenarians and are still proud to have quite a few in their 90's. Thanks to the latest edition of Reform (the national magazine of the URC) I learned that the world's oldest man is Robert Weighton who was born on 29 March 1908 in Hull and still lives in Britain. He was brought up within the Congregational and Presbyterian churches and went on to be a missionary teacher in Taiwan as an adult in the 1930's.

He seems to have led a fascinating life and still, at the age of 112, writes for his local church's magazine, which I think is URC but am not certain. When asked to what he attributes his longevity he replied "I just haven't died" There's hope for us all in these uncertain times!!! Anthony Bayley

#### Firemen at Beckenham United Reformed Church

A while ago, the church was contacted by the Imperial War Museum regarding a plaque and stained glass window erected in the old Beckenham United Reformed Church. It was to four firemen killed in World War 2. Although I had never seen the plaque or stained glass window, I was interested in the enquiry and started to do some research. Here is what I found out: - There was a fire in Chancery Lane, Beckenham, on the night of 16/17 April 1941 which three of the four firemen named on the plaque attended. On leaving the fire, intending to return to their fire station, they saw another fire at 40 Wickham Road on the corner of Court Downs Road. The fire was in the roof of a house where Canadian forces were billeted called Johannisbad, which was demolished in about 1959. They turned in that direction to render assistance. At about 2am, on turning into Court Downs Road, a high explosive bomb exploded about twenty feet behind the vehicle. Fragments pierced the petrol tank, igniting the petrol and enveloping the vehicle in flames immediately killing Fireman Richard Beacon aged 27 and Leading Fireman David Chalmers aged 31. The third man, Auxiliary-Fireman John H Maynard aged 37 was severely injured. He was dragged from the vehicle by an injured colleague and a Canadian serviceman and carried to a place of safety. He was then taken to Beckenham Hospital and later transferred to Horton Emergency Hospital, Epsom, where he died in November 1941. These three firemen are all buried in Beckenham Cemetery. A fourth man Auxiliary-Fireman Stanley Hudders also died at the same spot aged 30. The other fireman mentioned on the plaque is Fireman Percy Aitchinson

The other fireman mentioned on the plaque is Fireman Percy Aitchinson who died on 20<sup>th</sup> April 1941 aged 27 when a German bomb landed on Auxiliary Fire Service Station 2U which was housed in Old Palace LCC School in Bow along with 21 other colleagues. He is also buried at Beckenham Cemetery.

There is a plaque at the present Beckenham Fire Station to all 30 firemen who died as a result of enemy action in 1941.

It is also interesting to know that Hudders House in Churchfields Road and Chalmers House in Border Crescent are both named after these firemen. Why did the other two not have property or a road named after them? Does anyone have any photos of the plaque or the stained-glass windows that were in the church? Sheila G
